

MURRAY RE-ELECTED

Joseph Murray has been re-elected to the Clallam Conservation District board of supervisors. Joe has brought a "west-end" perspective to the board since 1994, both as a resident of Pysht and a silviculturist with Merrill & Ring Tree Farm for the past 33 years.

Murray was the only candidate to file for the position. According to state conservation district elections rules (WAC 135-110-370), if the incumbent is the only eligible candidate to file for the position, no election is required. Polling, which had been scheduled for March 21, was therefore not conducted.

The appointed position currently held by Nash Huber expires this year. Applications for the position were accepted by the Washington State Conservation Commission through the end of March. The Commission will make board appointments at their May 16th meeting.

RAIN GARDEN MENTOR SERVICES

For the past six months, Clallam Conservation District and WSU Clallam County Extension have been working together to provide rain garden mentor training to a group of Master Gardeners. Mentor services, which include assisting homeowners with site evaluations, design, and plant selection, as well as directing homeowners to other resources such as municipal incentive programs, will be available beginning in May. 2012 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Continued grant funding from the EPA and state Department of Ecology enabled us to provide cost-sharing assistance for implementation of 33 best management practices on 22 farms in 2012.

We continued providing technical and financial assistance to Dungeness Irrigation Group to replace their main canal with pipeline downstream of Highway 101. Much of this work, which has continued during the first few months of 2013, was paid for with a *Jobs Bill* grant from the state Conservation Commission. That same grant helped Agnew Irrigation District pipe two lateral ditches in the Taylor Cutoff Road area. These projects are expected to save approximately 2.5 cubic feet per second of Dungeness River water. In addition to improving irrigation efficiencies and restoring stream flows, these projects created or maintained approximately ten construction jobs for a period of five months.

Two fish-blocking culverts on tributaries to Coville Creek were replaced through the Family Forest Fish Passage Program (FFFPP).

A total of 239 individuals attended ten sustainable landscaping educational events and a low impact development demonstration project, including low water-use landscaping, was initiated in Sequim. A total of 161 individuals participated in five horse and livestock water quality workshops and presentations. And, over 600 fourth and fifth grade students participated in environmental education activities.



Three new landowners enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) completing native tree and shrub plantings along one mile of stream. Other conservation accomplishments include the following:

- 344 individuals assisted, included 68 soil test participants
- 7 farm plans prepared or updated for 131.7 acres
- Heavy use area protection on 11 farms
- Waste storage structures on 2 farms
- Roof runoff management on 4 farms
- 2,876 feet of riparian fencing on 2 farms

Expenditures for 2012 totaled nearly \$1 million. Grants – primarily state – comprised 98 percent of our revenues. Cost sharing on conservation practice implementation accounted for 62 percent of expenditures. About half of our 2012 expenditures were on irrigation water conservation projects.

WORKSHOPS FOR HORSE & LIVESTOCK OWNERS

READY, SET, GROW! MAKING the MOST of YOUR PASTURES

Join the Conservation District on a tour of the Swanberg family farm in Agnew. Working with the District since September 2011, the Swanbergs have built a graveled heavy use area for their horses, a concrete manure storage structure, cross-fenced 16 pasture areas to facilitate rotational grazing for cattle, horses, and sheep, and tested their soil to better manage pasture fertility. In addition to cattle, horses and sheep, they also raise pigs, chickens, ducks and bees.

Tips for timing of grazing, reseeding, fertilizing pastures and rotational grazing will be covered in detail.
